It's no surprise that the veterinary shortage has resulted in a vast amount of pet owners scrambling to find care for their pets. Both emergency and non-emergency offices continue to run with minimal staff as owners are faced with the added stress of finding the proper care for their pets when needed. Our shelter felt the pressure to bring these much needed services in-house as the local vets we utilized struggled to find space for our animals' spay/neuter appointments. When Dr. Brooke Groskopf agreed to join our team and help us open a spay/neuter clinic in our shelter, we were ecstatic to have her care for our animals, and we were even more excited about the service we could offer our community. We worked tirelessly over several months converting a storage room into a surgery suite and purchasing all the necessary equipment to open up the clinic. Our soft launch happened in November 2022, providing over 50 surgeries to shelter animals that had been waiting for spays and neuters.



On January 2, 2023, we officially opened our clinic to the public and to other local animal rescues faced with the same challenges. We are very proud to say our low-cost surgeries will provide pet owners the peace of mind that their animals are receiving timely, affordable, and quality care.


MUCH NEEDED SHELTER RENOVATION PLANNING IS UNDER WAY

Recently we have been sharing our big dreams for a much needed shelter renovation. This renovation will provide a safer and more peaceful living environment for our shelter animals. In addition, it will also provide increased space for our overall day to day shelter operations. This project would be completed in two phases: first the office/clinic spaces and then the dog kennel space. With the success of our spay/neuter clinic, it has already become very apparent that we need to expand to better serve our community and accommodate staff needs. In addition to expanding the surgery space itself, we will be adding dedicated cat and dog recovery rooms, offices for our staff members, a dedicated food pantry space, retail merchandise space, a bigger more centralized visitation space, and a community meeting/conference room. The second phase will include a complete renovation of the dog kennels both inside and outside, including a climate friendly indoor dog play/training area! We hope to break ground on phase one in 2023, and we anticipate this project to cost roughly \$2 million dollars. We are asking our community to help us make this project possible. The additional space will better assist our community as we continue to grow and offer much needed services. We are so excited about this initiative and the many ways in which it will improve the lives of all animals that come into our care. We know that with your help we can make this happen. KITTEN SEASON CONTINUES WELL INTO WINTER MONTHS

In 2022, the "kitten season" seemed unusually long as we faced a remarkable spike in kitten intake. Kitten season refers to the months when female cats typically give birth. This normally happens between April-October. This past year we were receiving kittens well into winter months, with a record intake of 336 kittens! Many times, tiny kittens arrive at the shelter with severe respiratory illnesses, fleas, or injuries requiring much needed extra care. Thankfully, our dedicated foster homes are quick to jump into action and help. Kittens like Mort, pictured to the right, often arrive severely in need of medical attention. After many rounds of antibiotics and eye washes, Mort slowly started to improve. It took nearly four months of care to get him ready for adoption. VOLUNTEERS DONATE OVER 2.000 HOURS

Our shelter might be little, but our volunteer team is mighty! In 2022, our 49 volunteers dedicated 2,838 hours of time cleaning the shelter, enriching the lives of our animals, or serving as ambassadors at community events and fundraisers. We really are the "Little shelter with the BIG heart", and we are truly grateful for all of our volunteers.

FIGHTING CHANCE FOR RASPBERRY

Little Raspberry blew up our Facebook page with not only her adorable little face but also her heartbreaking story. When she first arrived in foster care in mid-August, she was in terrible shape. She weighed only 10oz, her tail was dislocated, and she had a bot fly embedded in her neck. Her tail would have to be amputated, but she continued to heal in the loving care of her foster home. A few months later, Raspberry found herself in medical distress all over again when she was diagnosed with Toxoplasmosis, an infectious disease. Her foster mom raced her to the UW Madison vet clinic where she spent days in an oxygen chamber and received a "lung wash" to help her breath. She received diligent care, causing her vet bill to continue to rise. We held an online fundraiser, and raised over \$2,500. Her foster Mom, Nicole, along with another wonderful supporter, split the remaining \$2,000! Without the help of our community and these wonderful women, Raspberry would not have been able to have the fighting chance she did to survive.



FOSTERING ALLOWS SHELTER PETS A MUCH NEEDED BREAK

It's no surprise that the longer a dog is in a shelter environment, the more their temperament and personality diminish. Shelters are intended to provide a temporary home for a homeless pet, and it's never ideal to have animals there long term. Weekend sleepovers at some of our foster homes provide a relief from the stress of a kennel and provide the dog with new enrichment opportunities and experiences. "Prince and I first met on September 22, 2022. He came home with me that night and I knew right away that I had found my best friend. I've been working with a therapist for 3 years to help me cope with Complex Childhoood PTSD and Anxiety. My therapist had mentioned she thought I would benefit greatly from an emotional support dog, in addition to the medicine I take. She explained she felt the companionship and joy that dogs bring would help me work through my anxiety and PTSD with a friend by my side. My anxiety is something I've suffered with for as long as I can remember, even as a small child. Prince has been the best emotional support dog I could ask for, but most importantly, he is family. Prince has made it much easier for me to get out of bed and not let fear and anxiety dictate my life. We go on walks every morning, something I love to do but used to be too afraid to do alone. When we pass other dogs or humans, Prince stands in front of me to protect me, and hugs and kisses me when they pass to make sure I'm safe. Prince has changed my life in ways I never imagined would be possible. I not only get to experience the joys of being a dog mom, but I get to experience the joys of life that I missed out on because of my PTSD and anxiety. I never knew I could love so fiercely and unconditionally the way I love my sweet Prince. I am forever thankful for Prince and WHS for connecting me with my FURever best friend. -Jordan
